After being published anonymously, both Emily Dickinson and Nathaniel Hawthorne praised the work. Elizabeth Stuart Phelps Ward was also greatly influenced by Davis's *Life in the Iron Mills* and in 1868 published in *The Atlantic Monthly* *The Tenth of January*, based on the 1860 fire at the Pemberton Mills in Lawrence, Massachusetts.
