His sketch book with tales such as "Rip Van Winkle" "made Irving the first American author to attain an international reputation" (Fender 165). Whereas Irving's prior work, the History of New York (1809) is written in a neoclassical¹ tone right in the sense the Age of Reason and Enlightenment, "The Sketch Book [...], showed that Irving had gradually become a romanticist" (cf. Callow and Reilly 76). According to the "Oxford Companion to American Literature", Romanticism is a "term that is associated with imagination and boundlessness" (Hart 724). Furthermore, it was a movement that "elevated the individual, the passions, and the inner life. Romanticism, a reaction against neoclassicism, stressed strong emotion, imagination, freedom from classical correctness in art forms, and rebellion against social conventions"². The goal of this paper is to examine and explain the major romantic elements in Washington Irving's "Rip Van Winkle".
