Moreover, Socrates's study had an element that was actually contrary to the ideas of a whole ancient world. Socrates said that a person should not obey unconditionally law, traditions and conceptions of his state, but follow his own thoughts and go by own ideas in his political activity. It seemed especially dangerous to the founders of the new democracy of Athens. It could not allow a person to avoid his civil responsibilities; it could not allow a study that insisted that the power had to belong only to those who knew philosophical truth and that the substitution of positions by lots drawn by all the citizens (as it happened in Athens) was absurd. The democracy could not allow a citizen to obey, as Socrates told about himself in public, more his own inner voice (demon) than the

government of Athens.

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
