1. The Weighty Problem: If a chicken and a half lays an egg and a half in a day and a half, how many eggs does one chicken lay in one day? (Answer: 1 egg)

Hard Maths Trick Questions for Older Kids (Ages 12+)

These questions are designed to really challenge even the brightest young minds:

1. The River Crossing: A farmer needs to take a fox, a chicken, and a bag of grain across a river. He can only take one item at a time in his boat. If he leaves the fox and chicken alone, the fox will eat the chicken. If he leaves the chicken and grain alone, the chicken will eat the grain. How does he solve this problem? (Answer: He takes the chicken first, then the fox, then returns for the grain. The chicken is safe from the grain).
1. The Clock Puzzle: How many times a day do the minute and hour hands of a clock overlap? (Answer: 22 times)
1. The Train Tracks: Two trains are heading towards each other on the same track at 60 mph. They are 120 miles apart. A bird flies back and forth between the trains at 100 mph until the trains collide. How far does the bird fly? (Answer: 100 miles)
1. The Locker Problem: There are 100 lockers in a row, all closed. A person goes through and opens every locker. Then, a second person goes through and closes every second locker. A third person goes through and changes the state of every third locker (opens if closed, closes if open). This

continues until 100 people have gone through. Which lockers are open at the end? (Answer: Lockers with perfect square numbers are open – 1, 4, 9, 16, 25, 36, 49, 64, 81, 100)
